ATTENTION HOMEOWNERS!

Some of our Homeowners are having problems with water coming from the ceiling into their condo. Many times the problem is that the drain line from the air conditioning unit is clogged, causing the pan to fill and overflow onto the ceiling, unbeknown to the homeowner. The ceiling holds that water until it becomes so saturated, it comes through the ceiling and causes some real damage.

Resolution?? Have your heat/AC units checked each spring and fall to prevent this from happening. Having a contract with a reputable heating/air-conditioning firm will save you a lot of unexpected costs.

No-Bake Chocolate Walnut Squares

1 cup margarine, divided
6 one-ounce squares semi-sweet chocolate
1 cup flaked coconut
1-1/2 cups graham cracker crumbs
1/2 cup chopped walnuts
2 eight ounce packages cream cheese, softened
1 cup sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla

- 1 Microwave 3/4 cup margarine and 2 ounces chocolate squares on high 1 to 2 minutes or until melted when stirred, stirring every 30 seconds.
- 2 Stir in graham cracker crumbs, coconut, and walnuts.
- 3 Press mixture onto bottom of 13 by 9 inch baking pan.
- 4 Chill for 30 minutes.
- 5 Microwave remaining margarine and chocolate squares on high 1 or 2 minutes or until melted when stirred, stirring every 30 seconds.
- 6 Spread mixture over cream cheese layer.
- 7 Chill.
- 8 Cut into squares. Yields 4 dozen.

We are almost halfway through the year. With help from the rain, extra effort from Valley Crest Landscape Company, the Troon Landscape Committee, and our residents, Troon has never looked better.

We still have more to do. As you all know, the Troon entrances are completed. Hopefully, we can complete landscaping the Kildaire Farm berm with Blue Rug junipers within a few weeks.

After the berm, the next project will be the McKirkland wall. And finally we will look at the north end of Troon on the Tanas side.

There are just a few shrubs within the community that we are looking at replacing. In addition, some of the homeowners, at their expense and with landscape committee approval in writing, will be replacing or adding shrubs around their own homes.

Valley Crest is monitoring ant hills and other insects, even though this isn't in their current contract. They have also sprayed for fungus on a few shrubs, which also is not in their contract.

We have spent quite a bit of time with Foster Lake Management and are currently creating a plan, long term and short term, for our pond.

Please continue to make your landscape requests on the form provided in the clubhouse.

A History of Troon

Paul Phillippe has researched a history of Troon at Kildaire from 1999 through November, 2005, when the last unit was sold. Paul has been kind enough to share this history with us, so kick off your shoes, relax, and see what your friends and neighbors were doing "way back when."

If you have information to add, please contact Paul.

This is a broad overview of how WKB and new homeowners gave birth to the vibrant community of Troon in just six years. The details of how issues were framed and struggled with (the 'devil' and 'god' are in the details) can be found elsewhere by those interested.

The Village of Troon at Kildare was conceived and created by WKB Developers and Builders. The 28 acre wooded site was formed through the purchases of separate land parcels. The site of the clubhouse was a 3/4 acre parcel WKB was required to purchase to allow a construction entrance separate from Kildaire Farm Road.

The Town of Cary stipulated that only right turns could be made from the Kildare entrance onto Kildaire Farm Road. The Town required all building permits to be purchased at one time as a means of limiting detached single family housing water consumption.

After three years of planning and altering plans as required by the Town of Cary, work was started on the site in 1999. Numerous retaining walls were built and the original plan for 140 patio homes was downsized to 136 when it was learned some superstitious souls would not buy in a building numbered 13!

WKB originally planned to use the pond water for irrigation, but changed plans and dug a well. It was learned that the Town of Cary had at one time drawn water from 2 wells on the site to supply drinking water for the town.

The Village of Troon Condominium Association was incorporated 20 January 2000 with an Executive Board of Directors of William F. Koch, Jr., Joe S. Johnson, and Max Williams.

The first closings were in August 2001. Betty Thompson and Phil Wilcox from Fonville-Morisey

New Homes were a very successful sales force and the following 14 units were sold in August.

The early owners had to deal with construction traffic, mud, and cars turning in their driveways as people were looking over Troon – while learning to manage a growing new community!

On December 4, 2001, WKB announced Charleston Management Corporation would help manage Troon by collecting monthly fees and answering homeowners questions.

In March 2002 Jeanne Wilcox was the first homeowner to be elected to the Board of Directors. She was a well organized active volunteer in getting many involved in the work of Troon development.

The first newspaper was published in July-August

2002 by Joe Long. Nancy Sessoms and Elizabeth Scales were acknowledged for their landscaping work. There were now 51 home owners.

In September-October, the name of the newsletter was *The Trooner*. Pearl Rosenberg and Joyce Patton were listed as editors and the following homeowners were listed as committee chairs:

- Social – Wilma Hancock
- Finance – Dewey Borst/Dick Cinoman
- Clubhouse and Pool – Dewey Borst
- Landscape – Nancy Sessoms
- Library - Shirlene Smith

The Finance Committee under Dewey Borst and Dick Cinoman helped develop plans from the beginning small group of owners to the final takeover from WKB.

The 2002 budget was created by WKB and \$2,000 was borrowed from the reserve fund to buy approved needs at the clubhouse and pool. Previous contracts drawn up by WKB for services at Troon were fixed and fees promised.

The 2003 budget was 80 percent predetermined by WKB. The finance committee again had little control of the 2004 budget. Audit, pool, legal, insurance, and landscaping contracts as well as capital reserve allotments were not homeowner determined.

In late 2003, Dewey Borst joined Joe Long and Bud Johnson on the Troon Board of Directors as homeowners prepared to assume responsibility for financial management of the condo association.

After July 28, 2004, the board consisted of the following members :

Dick Mochrie – Vice Chair

Dewey Borst – Treasurer

Ann Messler – Secretary

Finance Committee members John Hancock, Dick Cinoman, and Jim Totten developed and had approved the 2005 Troon Budget of \$230,000.

The Landscape Committee worked to find money and ideas to make Troon an attractive place. Early on they convinced WKB to provide \$2,000.00 for landscaping at the entrance. WKB had a landscaping

plan approved by the Town of Cary and homeowners often wanted different shrubs and plantings. WKB informed the members of the landscape committee that their role was to be an advisory one and they were not to take action until homeowners were in place.

The pond area was the source of landscaping disagreements with WKB for a long time.

As landscaping rules were altered for the homeowners' areas, the committee always had a shortage of funds to implement changes. Even maintenance sometimes had more needs than available funds.

The Pool and Club House Committee began early to find money and ideas to develop these areas into ways of supplying homeowners' needs for recreation and fellowship.

When the first Troon residents moved in, the pool was under construction, while the clubhouse was finished and partially furnished. HOA members were surprised to learn furnishings for the club and pool provided by WKB at the time of home purchases were to be paid for by the HOA.

The equipment in the exercise room was supplied by both homeowners gifts and HOA purchases.

Additional furnishings were added in the ladies bathroom and in the two rooms that were to serve members as library sources.

When the pool was finished in 2002, a gas grill was purchased and members of the pool committee supervised the use and daily water testing of pool water.

A library was begun based on members donations and over time, as it grew, additional book cases were purchased to house the generous giving of members.

The November -December newsletter listed Bob Menasian as Chair of the Landscaping Committee.

There were 61 home owners.

In the January-February 2003 newsletter, Joe Long was listed as publisher and monthly movies were being shown in the clubhouse.

Bridge and exercise classes were scheduled and an Italian dinner and a potluck party were scheduled.

The May-June newspaper announced there were 75 homeowners. Charleston Management company requested a fee increase which was denied. Dewey Borst, Joe Long, and Jeanne Wilcox agreed to help with homeowner's questions.

In August 2003 Joe Long joined Jeanne Wilcox on the Board of Directors.

The July - August newsletter had an appeal from Joe Long for volunteers to help with getting Troon and the Board of Directors ready for assuming management of Troon (the transition team).

A group of homeowners had met with officials of the Town of Cary to discuss problems related to entrances/exits, general public traffic turning through Troon, and speeding cars.

Pearl Rosenberg and Pat Questell helped organize a book club.

A cookout was held on 4 July.

The newsletter in November 2003 was titled THE TROON VILLAGE NEWSPAPER. There were now 119 home owners.

Jeanne Wilcox resigned from the HOA Board of Directors and the following volunteers were listed:

The December newspaper announced Dewey Borst as the new HOA Board Director. The Transition Team was headed by Jim Totten with members Lori Kosej, Dick Mochrie, Tom Owens and Jerry Wolberg.

The May 2004 newspaper revealed there were 126 owners. WKB was beginning to move their construction equipment from Troon as they finished the project started in 1999.

For the second time, WKB denied homeowners' request for a mailbox cover.

The transition team provided a checklist of problems WKB should be expected to correct before HOA officials release them from responsibility for completion of Troon.

John Hancock provided information regarding termite control issues. Dewey Borst and Frank Smith submitted a list of things needed for the club house and pool.

A group of Troon owners met with the Town of Cary officials to discuss a list of items that included street lights, street maintenance (desire to get the city to assume responsibility for Baines and Troon Village streets), left turn signal for the traffic light just after the turn onto Cary Parkway, and other potential changes.

On June 15, 2004, the Troon Homeowners Association agreed to assume responsibility for the management of Troon. The official date of transfer was July 28, 2004).

The July Newspaper stated 129 units had been sold.

The Board of Directors consisted of the following members:

Bob Gehrer joined the pool and clubhouse committee and organized a men's card game group.

September's newsletter revealed much activity as the homeowners increased their management work.

Homeowners met with Tim Bradley, Director of Engineering for the Town of Cary, and discussed several issues regarding problems with entrances and exits. Information was exchanged about the city taking over main streets in Troon.

The transition team was busy drawing up a list of talking points as WKB was working to sell its last units and close out their Troon project. A list of over 40 items was compiled.

Jim Totten submitted a letter requesting the HOA to hire an outside firm to gain guidance on how to make Troon a well maintained community with an adequate reserve fund.

A proposed change in street lights was decided against because of the cost.

The social committee scheduled an outside speaker on the history and heritage of Cary. A game table was donated to the clubhouse and a domino group was formed.

4 Feb. 2005 Reserve Advisors, Inc. submitted a formal study of the reserve fund. They projected significant shortages unless the funding was changed.

On April 12, 2005 Dick Mochrie led Dewey Borst, Marilynn Wolberg, and Glenn Sexton in a meeting with Tim Bailey, Director of Engineering for the Town of Cary in discussions about unresolved issues with WKB. Tim brought many of his supervisors and progress was made in several areas, although many issues would not be settled until 2006.

The *Troon Village Newsletter* of August 2005 listed the following volunteers:

A September hotdog and ice cream party and a December Holiday party were planned.

The social committee reinstated the monthly ladies luncheons.

The Clubhouse continued to add fixtures, furniture, and books.

The pool had unexpected expenses and it was noted many people were using it.

An inquiry was to be made into finding a new management company to replace Charleston Management Company.

On 4 Nov 2005, WKB sold the last unit to David and Carol Morrison. The Troon HOA under Jeanne Wilcox and Joe Long had successfully brought a new community into being with WKB developers and builders.

WKB's Mary Lavoie was often mentioned as a key

helpful administrator Troon people appreciated. Tim Dunlop was often helpful to homeowners in resolving construction problems. Bud Johnson had provided guidance and encouragement to the Troon HOA Directors while supervising the construction of a new multi-million-dollar dollar condo project.
